
May this conference be, for each and every one of us, a time of spiritual renewal, deep fellowship, and recharged zeal for the mission.



PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

District Constitution By-Law I

To expedite the work of the District Conference, proceedings shall be conducted in a spirit of Christian love and fellowship and in accordance with Robert's Rules of Order.

Membership

Participation in Conference business shall be limited to those holding active credentials with the Quebec District of The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, as well as lay delegates who present a current letter from their church identifying them as official representatives. All members of the Conference must register with the Roster Committee.

Conference Bar

All members participating in Conference business must be previously registered with the Roster Committee in order to be recognized as Members of the Conference.

Addressing the Chair

All members speaking to the Conference must direct their remarks to the Chair. After standing and addressing the Chairman, the member shall wait to be recognized by the Chair before proceeding to speak. Dialogue on the Conference floor is not permitted.

Speaking to a Motion

When speaking to a motion, a member is expected to complete their remarks and then refrain from speaking again to the same motion until all others who so wish may do so.

Alternate Speakers

After one member has spoken to a motion, the same motion should not be spoken to by another speaker until opportunity has been made for a member to speak in opposition to the motion, if there should be such.

Punctuality

Members of the Conference are requested to be in their designated places at the commencement of each session. Movement in and out of the meeting area is distracting and should be minimized.

Announcements

All public announcements must be submitted to the Conference Secretary in writing. All such announcements must be made from the rostrum.

MINUTES OF THE 2023 DISTRICT CONFERENCE

Thirteenth District Conference Carrefour chrétien de la Capitale - Quebec City (QC) May 9-10, 2023

FIRST BUSINESS SESSION

Tuesday, May 9, 2023

1.1 Call to Order and Announcements

The Chair called the first session of the Thirteenth District Conference to order at 1:09 p.m. He mentioned, in English, that receivers are available at the entrance for unilingual English-speaking delegates.

Anyone wishing to speak during the sessions must introduce themselves at the microphone in their aisle and may do so in their own language.

1.2 Appreciation to the Host Pastor

The Chair took the opportunity to thank the senior pastor of Carrefour chrétien de la Capitale, Reverend Paul Corriveau, who welcomed us, and was asked to say a few words of welcome.

1.3 Introduction and report by the Representative of the International Office

The Chair invited Reverend David Wells, General Superintendent, to address the delegates and give his report.

1.4 Introduction of Other International Office Representatives and Prayer

The Chair acknowledged the presence of Reverend Murray Cornelius from the International Missions Department, as well as guest missionaries Never Muparutsa and Munetsi Zowa, who will be with us during this congress, and asked him to lead us in prayer.

1.5 Basic Parliamentary Procedure

The Chair invited the delegates to consult the Basic Parliamentary Procedure in the Conference booklet on page 6.

1.6 Presentation on the Voting System

The Chair showed the video explaining the Simply Voting System. He added that all delegates have received the first ballot by e-mail and have 3 minutes to confirm their attendance.

1.7 Omnibus Vote on Motions 1 to 7

The Chair mentioned that an omnibus vote will be taken at the end for the next 7 motions.

1.8 Motions

Motion 1: Roster Committee Report and Voting Bar

The Chair invited Reverend John Ippolito to display the Roster Report on screen.

The Secretary-Treasurer moved that the Roster Report be received.

It is moved and seconded that the Roster Report be received. CARRIED.

The Chair invited the Chair of the Resolutions Committee (Reverend Joe Friedland) to come forward and read the remaining 6 motions.

Motion 2: Voting Bar

It is moved that the voting bar be designated by those registered and entitled to vote, and who have received confirmation of their vote at the UNIQUE e-mail address provided.

Motion 3: Ratification of Credential Candidates for 2021-2023

It is moved that all candidates for credentials listed on pages 15 and 16 of the Conference Booklet and approved by the Leadership Team be accepted by the Voting Assembly.

Motion 4: Voting Privilege

It is moved that voting privileges be granted to Reverend Anne Yank (Eastern Ontario District) and Reverend Murray Cornelius of the International Office. Reverend David Wells, General Superintendent, is recognized ex officio as a voting member of the District.

Motion 5: Conference Committees

It is moved that the following committees be adopted: Parliamentarians and Resolutions, Roster Committee, Review of Minutes and Scrutineers, as listed in the Conference Booklet on page 17.

Motion 6: Conference Schedule

It is moved that the 2023 Conference schedule, found on the front page in the Conference Booklet and on delegate badges be approved.

Motion 7: Adoption of the Minutes of the 2021 Conference (May 11)

It is moved that the Minutes of the eleventh Quebec District Conference, held on May 11, 2021, sent by mail and included in the Conference Booklet on pages 7 to 13 be approved.

The Chair invited the delegates to vote by "Simply Voting" on motions 1 to 7. Delegates were given 3 minutes to vote. Due to a technical failure, the vote was taken by a show of hands.

Moved, seconded and carried.

1.9 Introducing the New Credential Holders and Lay Delegates

The Chair welcomed all the new credential holders and lay delegates present and asks them to stand up.

1.10 Introducing the representatives of the U.S. Assemblies of God

The Chair welcomed Mrs. Raegan Glugosh, Regional Director of Missions for the Assemblies of God in the United States, and the missionaries accompanying her.

1.11 Change of Chair

The Superintendent invited Reverend John Ippolito to assume the chair.

1.12 Presentation of the Superintendent's Report

The Chair informed delegates that the Superintendent's report is presented by video.

1.13 Superintendent's Reports, Question Period

The Chair then gave delegates the opportunity to ask questions. The Chair thanked the Superintendent for his report.

1.14 Change of Chair

The Chair invited Reverend Michel Bisaillon to resume the chair.

1.15 Presentation of the Assistant to the Superintendent's Report

The Chair informed the delegates that the Assistant to the Superintendent's report is presented by video

1.16 Assistant to the Superintendent's Report, Question Period

The Chair then gave delegates the opportunity to ask questions. The Chair thanked the Assistant to the Superintendent for his report.

1.17 Presentation of the Secretary-Treasurer's Report (Administration and Statistics)

The Chair informed the delegates that the report is being presented by video and mentioned that there would be a question period after the financial report, which would be presented later.

1.18 Announcements and Coffee Break

The Chair reminded us to visit the kiosks. Some have gifts to give away, including Musique Gagné, who will be raffling off an acoustic Yamaha guitar.

He also mentioned that churches with a total budget of less than 50 000 \$ can request a subsidy form, which is available at the registration desk.

1.19 Adjournment

The Chair declared the meeting adjourned at 2:37 pm.

SECOND BUSINESS SESSION

Tuesday, May 9, 2023

2.1 Call to order

The Chair called the meeting to order at 3:18 pm.

2.2 Presentation of the Secretary-Treasurer's Report (DQ Finances)

The Chair mentioned to delegates that the Financial Report is presented by video and allowed a question period.

2.3 Ouestion Period

The Chair then gave delegates the opportunity to ask questions. The Chair thanked the Secretary-Treasurer for his report.

2.4 Secretary-Treasurer Nomination Vote (Simply Voting)

The Chair read by-law 3.5.1.1 of the District Constitution concerning the nomination of the Secretary-Treasurer.

3.5.1.1 The District Secretary-Treasurer shall be elected by the District Conference after at least one name has been presented in nomination to the Conference by the District Leadership Team with further nominations accepted from the floor in a Nominating Ballot. All votes shall be publicly recorded.

The Leadership Team therefore nominated Reverend John Ippolito for the position of Secretary-Treasurer.

The Chair mentioned that the list of eligible ordained candidates can be found in the Conference Booklet on page 17. He added that if you write the surname in the program, the full name will appear.

The Chair invited delegates to vote. A 3-minute voting period was granted before closing the ballot.

2.5 Presentation of the Master's College & Seminary Report

The MCS report was presented by video. The Chair announced that the President, Reverend Rich Janes, had completed his term of office on April 30.

2.6 Results of the Vote to Nominate the Secretary-Treasurer

The results were displayed on the screen and as agreed and according to the District Constitution, when there are more than two thirds of the votes, we have an election:

John Ippolito 100 % Total votes: 89

The Chair invited Reverend John Ippolito to address the delegates. Reverend Ippolito thanked the delegates for their vote of confidence.

Reverend Brent Robillard was invited to pray for Reverend Ippolito.

2.7 Results of the Pre-conference Nominations (by the Leadership Team and Pastoral College) for Members at Large

The Chair read by-laws 3.1.2.1 and 3.1.2.2 of the Constitution concerning the nomination of Members at Large. The results of the vote were displayed on the screen.

3.1.2.1 The Sectional Pastors and District Officers shall form a nominating committee to place a minimum of six and no more than nine candidates in nomination to the District Conference for the positions of the three District Leadership Team Members at Large.

3.1.2.2 From the slate of nominees three Members at Large shall be elected by the District Conference to serve on the District Leadership Team. A simple majority and a plurality of votes are required for election on any election ballot. Should all positions not be filled on the first election ballot, then the candidates with a simple majority would be considered elected and the name receiving the lowest number of votes shall be dropped on this and any subsequent ballots until all the positions are filled.

The list of candidates was displayed on the screen in order of number of votes received. The biographical notes of each candidate are printed on pages 18 and 19 of the Conference Booklet:

2.8 Vote #1 of Members-at-Large Made by the Conference (Simply Voting)

The Chair specified that three names must be written down. The Chair invited the delegates to vote. A period of 5 minutes was allowed for voting before closing the ballot.

2.9 Results of Vote #1 of Members-at-Large

The results were displayed on the screen. The Chair asked the Secretary-Treasurer to announce the results.

Total votes: 82

- 1. Kyvenz Amédée 74 %
- 2. Jean-Frédéric Laroche 64,5 %
- 3. Guy Gosselin 47,1 %
- 4. Gaétan Gaucher 42 %
- 5. Ronald Rust 36 %
- 6. Nelson Beaudry 36 %

The Chair announced that Pastors Kyvenz Amédée and Jean-Frédéric Laroche have been elected as Members-at-Large to the Leadership Team and invited them to address the assembly.

2.10 Vote #2 of Members-at-Large Made by the Conference (Simply Voting)

The Chair specified that only one name was to be written.

The Chair invited the delegates to vote. A 3-minute voting period was allowed before closing the ballot.

2.11 Results of vote # 2 of Members-at-Large Made by the Conference (Simply Voting)

The Chair invited the Secretary-Treasurer to announce the result, which were displayed on the screen.

Total votes: 84

- 1. Guy Gosselin 34,1%
- 2. Gaétan Gaucher 23,5%
- 3. Nelson Beaudry 22,4%
- 4. Ronald Rust 20 %

The Chair announced that there is no election. Ronald Rust's name was withdrawn, and a 3rd vote was called.

2.12 Vote # 3 of Members-at-Large Made by the Conference (Simply Voting)

The Chair specified that only one name was to be written.

The Chair invited the delegates to vote. A 5-minute voting period was allowed before closing the ballot.

2.13 Presentation of the Institut biblique du Québec Report

The Chair informed the delegates that the report by the President of IBQ, Reverend Jonathan Bersot, is presented by video. The Chair thanked Reverend Jonathan Bersot and Reverend David Martin.

2.14 Results of vote # 3 of Members-at-Large Made by the Conference (Simply Voting)

The Chair invited the Secretary-Treasurer to announce the result, which were displayed on the screen.

Total votes: 81

- 1. Guy Gosselin 43,2 %
- 2. Gaétan Gaucher 30,9 %
- 3. Nelson Beaudry 25,9 %

The Chair announced that there is no election. Pastor Nelson Beaudry's name was withdrawn, and a 4th vote was called.

2.15 Vote # 4 of Members-at-Large Made by the Conference (Simply Voting)

The Chair specified that only one name is to be written.

The Chair invited the delegates to vote. A 5-minute voting period was allowed before closing the ballot.

2.16 Results of vote # 4 of Members-at-Large Made by the Conference (Simply Voting)

The Chair invited the Secretary-Treasurer to announce the results, which were displayed on the screen.

Total votes: 81

- 1. Guy Gosselin 64,2 %
- 2. Gaétan Gaucher 35,8 %

The Chair announced that Reverend Guy Gosselin was elected Member-at-Large to the Leadership Team and invited Pastors Kyvenz Amédée, Jean-Frédéric Laroche and Reverend Guy Gosselin to address the assembly.

The Chair asked the Reverend Gary Connors to pray for the members of the Leadership Team.

2.17 Adjournment

The Chair declared the meeting adjourned at 4:40 pm.

THIRD BUSINESS SESSION

Wednesday, May 10, 2023

3.1 Call to order and Announcement

The Chair called the meeting to order at 9:15 a.m. and reminded everyone that there will be a draw for a Musique Gagné guitar. The Chair discussed child sponsorship with ERDO and ChildCare Plus.

3.2 Results of the Pre-conference Vote of the English and First Nations Representatives

The Chair read the result posted on screen.

3.3 Ratification Vote of the English and First Representatives

The Chair invited delegates to vote. A 2-minute voting period was allowed before closing the ballot.

3.4 Results of the Ratification Vote of the Representatives of the English and First Nations Sections

The Chair invited the Secretary-Treasurer to give the result, which were displayed on the screen.

English: Pauline Richard 98.4% (61 votes)
First Nations: Reggie Neeposh 100% (58 votes)

The Chair congratulated the Reverends Pauline Richard and Reggie Neeposh and invited them to say a few words

3.5 Pastoral College - Voting of Section Pastors (Simply Voting)

The Chair read by-laws 3.9.2.1/3.9.3.2/3.9.3.3 and 3.9.3.4 of the District Constitution concerning the election of section pastors.

3.9.2 Qualifications

3.9.2.1 The section pastors shall be credential holders of mature experience, sound character and recognized ability, who are either ordained, or have been credentialed for a period of not less than five consecutive years with The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada. They must have served at least one year in the Québec District immediately prior to election.

3.9.3 Nominations and Elections

3.9.3.2. Each section shall conduct a nomination vote. Each eligible voter, as described in Article VIII, Section 2 and 3, shall be eligible to cast a nomination ballot for a section pastor for his or her respective section. This vote shall take place no less than 30 days prior to the District Conference.

3.9.3.3 From the nomination ballot, the candidates receiving the two highest numbers of votes shall form an election ballot that shall be presented at the District Conference to all eligible voters. The person receiving the highest number of votes shall be declared elected.

3.9.3.4 The term of office for the section pastors shall be two years.

The names of Reverend Ronald Rust, Reverend Patrick St-Onge and Pastor Kyvenz Amédée have been selected by the District Leadership Team.

The District conference was invited to select only one name.

3.8 Conference Vote #1 of a General Executive Board Member

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO DISTRICT CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

District Conference 2025

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS at the 2024 General Conference, it was decided that ministers, including those holding an active and current **Ministry Related** (previously Church Related) credential, have voting privileges;

AND, WHEREAS the District of Quebec Constitution & By-Laws does not make provision for ministers holding an active and current Ministry Related (previously Church Related) credential to have voting privileges at the District Conference;

BE IT RESOLVED that Article 8 Section 2 be amended as follows:

8.2 Membership

All those who hold valid ministerial credentials with The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, and who have their permanent residence within the boundaries of the Québec District or who serve on the pastoral staff of a church within the Québec District, or who meet the criteria of Article 10 of the General Constitution and By-Laws of The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada shall be recognized as members of the Corporation entitled to vote at the District Conference except for those who hold the non-voting Church Related credential. The General Superintendent of The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada shall be recognized, ex officio, as a member of the District.

The following three candidates have agreed to let their names stand for the position of Superintendent. They are listed in order of the percentage of votes received.




Paul Tétreault

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INDEPENDENT PRACTITIONER'S REVIEW ENGAGEMENT REPORT

To the Directors of Quebec District of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada

We have reviewed the accompanying non-consolidated financial statements of Quebec District of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, that comprise the non-consolidated statement of financial position as at December 31, 2024, and the non-consolidated statements of revenues and expenses, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Non-Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these non-consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of non-consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Practitioner's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express a conclusion on the accompanying non-consolidated financial statements based on our review. We conducted our review in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements, which require us to comply with relevant ethical requirements.

A review of non-consolidated financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted standards for review engagements is a limited assurance engagement. The practitioner performs procedures, primarily consisting of making inquiries of management and others within the entity, as appropriate, and applying analytical procedures, and evaluates the evidence obtained.

The procedures performed in a review are substantially less in extent than, and vary in nature from, those performed in an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion on these non-consolidated financial statements.

Basis for Qualified Conclusion

Note 2 describes the acounting policy with respect to the organization's real estate property and equipment. This indicates that the organization capitalized its real estate property and equipment at cost and no provision for amortization has been taken. Canadian generally accepted accounting principles require that real estate property and equipment be recorded at cost when acquired and amortization be recognized as an expense based on the ueful life of the asset. In this respect, the financial statements are not in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. The effect of this departure from Canadian generally accepted accounting principles on these financial statements is not reasonably determinable.

In common with many charitable organizations, the organization derives revenue from donations, the completeness of which is not susceptible to us obtaining evidence we considered necessary for the purpose of the review. Accordingly, the evidence obtained of these revenues was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to contributions, statement of revenue and expenses, financial position and changes in net assets. Our conclusion on the financial statements as at December 31, 2024 was modified accordingly because of the possible effects of this limitaiton in scope.

Qualified Conclusion

Based on our review, except for the possible effects of the matter described in the Basis for Qualified Conclusion paragraph, nothing has come to our attention that causes us to believe that the non-consolidated financial statements do not present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Quebec District of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada as at December 31, 2024, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.



1. PURPOSE OF THE ORGANIZATION

The main purpose of the organization is to promulgate the gospel of Jesus Christ, establish new congregations and provide leadership and support to those church workers in the District which are affiliated with the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada. The organization is an integral part of The Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada, which was established by Letters Patent on May 17, 1919, and derives its jurisdiction and authority from the General Conference. The organization is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and is exempt from income taxes.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The organization applies the Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Non-consolidation of financial statements

The financial statements are not consolidated because the Members have access to all relevant information and have therefore unanimously agreed on the preparation of non-consolidated financial statements. These non-consolidated financial statements have not been prepared for general purposes and accordingly, some users may require further information. The results of operations of the subministry is detailed in note 11.

Financial instruments

Initial measurement

The organization initially measures its financial assets and liabilities originated or exchanged in arm's length transactions at fair value. Financial assets and liabilities originated or exchanged in related party transactions, except for those that involve parties whose sole relationship with the organization is in the capacity of management, are initially measured at cost.

Subsequent measurement

The organization subsequently measures all its financial assets and liabilities at cost or amortized cost, except for investments in equity instruments that are quoted in an active market, which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value of these financial instruments are recognized in income in the period incurred.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost using the straight-line method include cash, accounts receivables, and loans receivable.

Financial liabilities measured at amortizes cost include accounts payable and accrued charges, deferred revenue and undistributed designations.

Financial instruments (continued)

Impairment

For financial assets measured at cost or amortized cost, the organization determines whether there are indications of possible impairment. When there are, and the organization determines that a significant adverse change has occurred during the period in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows, a write-down is recognized in income. If the indicators of impairment have decreased or no longer exist, the previously recognized impairment loss may be reversed to the extent of the improvement. The carrying amount of the financial asset may not be greater than the amount that would have been reported at the date of the reversal had the impairment not been recognized previously. The amount of the reversal is recognized in income.

Transaction costs

Transaction costs attributable to financial instruments subsequently measured at fair value and to those originated or exchanged in a related party transaction are recognized in income in the period incurred. Transaction costs related to financial instruments originated or exchanged in an arm's length transaction that are subsequently measured at amortized cost are recognized in the original cost of the instrument. When the instrument is measured at amortized cost, transaction costs are recognized in income over the life of the instrument using the straight-line method.

Cash and cash equivalents

The organization's policy is to present bank balances under cash and cash equivalents, including bank indebtednesses when bank balances that fluctuate frequently from being positive to overdrawn.

Use of estimates

The preparation of non-consolidated financial statements requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the amounts recognized as revenues and expenses for the periods covered. Actual results may differ from these estimates. The critical estimates relate to the provision for doubtful accounts and the impairment of financial assets.

Real estate property and equipment

Real estate property and equipment are recorded at cost. The organization does not record amortization.

Revenue recognition

The organization follows the deferral method of accounting for donations, including tithes, contributions and offerings. Designated contributions are recognized as revenue in the year on which the related expenses are incurred, when the amount can be reasonably measured and the collection is reasonably assured. Other contributions are recognized as revenue when received.

Revenue recognition (continued)

Rent revenue is recognized as income in the month it is earned. Interest income and revenues generated from short term investments are recorded on an accrual basis.

Volunteer services

The organization receives volunteer services, the value of which cannot be reasonably estimated. Therefore, no representation of these costs are reflected in the financial statements.

11. CONTROLLED NOT-FOR-PROFIT ORGANIZATION

The Québec District of the Pentecostal Assemblies of Canada (the District) controls the Institut Biblique du Québec (the Institute) by virtue of its ability to influence the strategic and operational aspects of this Organization.

Institut Biblique du Québec

The Institute was established to provide theological education and pastoral training. The Institute is incorporated under Part 3 of the Quebec Companies Act and is recognized as a registered charity under the Income Tax Act. During the year, the Institute used premises owned by the District and contributed \$75,000 (2023 - \$75,000) towards the operating costs of the premises. The Institute follows the accrual basis of accounting and has not been consolidated in the District's financial statements.

12. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

Financial risks

The significant risks arising from financial instruments to which the organization is exposed as at December 31, 2024 are detailed below.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the organization will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The organization is exposed to this risk mainly in respect of its long-term debt and accounts payable.

Credit risk

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial asset will cause a financial loss for the organization by failing to discharge an obligation. The organization's credit risk is mainly related to accounts receivable and loans receivable. The organization performs ongoing evaluations of its churches and members financial condition and limits the amount of credit extended when considered necessary.

Interest rate risk

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in interest rates. The organization is exposed to interest rate risk on its fixed-interest rate financial instruments. Fixed interest rate instruments subject the organization to a fair value risk, since fair value fluctuates inversely to changes in market interest rates.
